A letter from Paul. . .

The other day I was in front of our condominium watering the planters. In the bushes immediately in front of our unit, an industrious spider had spun an enormous web, easily three feet wide, stretching from the bushes to the railing and wall that frame our entryway. It was quite beautiful in its symmetry and the way that it glistened in the sun. A flying insect of some sort flew into the web, causing a vibration and instantaneously from the bushes raced a 2-inch spider and within seconds had pounced upon the prey. I was both repelled and attracted at the same time.

Later that day I was watching a news report, and I saw a report of some children in Bridgeport who were collecting school materials for children in parts of Connecticut who were victims of the recent flooding, whose families had suffered damage to or loss of homes and property. I thought back on the spider web and those children. We are all connected in a web of life. What happened on one side of the structure has impact all across. The struggling fly tells the spider it's dinnertime. The pictures of washed-out homes tell children that there are peers who may not have the necessities to begin school.

We know that what happens here – matters there. John Donne famously said, "No man (sic) is an island unto himself (sic)." When an athlete wins an Olympic gold, we cheer and feel good along with them. When there is a school shooting, we weep, hearts break, and we mourn along with the victims. By our having received the breath of God at our births we are woven into the web of life. Moses, in his last words to the wandering Hebrew nation, pointing out the land of milk and honey on the other side of the Jordan reminded them of their responsibility. "Choose today the way of life, or the way of death." What we do is felt all around the world in the web that unites all creation.


Choose well because we and others matter to God. Shalom

## **Front Window History Continued**

In the July View, I provided a summary of the Front window and the history behind the top part of the window. This September 21<sup>st</sup> marks the 27<sup>th</sup> year of the window's dedication. I hope you enjoy the remaining summary.

#### Left Bottom Window section:

- Beginning at the bottom are the tablets the <u>Ten Commandments</u>.
- Next is the <u>Old Church</u> which was formerly located on Main Street. Look closely at the window, variegated pink represents its stained-glass windows similar to those now lighted in the Narthex.
- The <u>Lamp of Knowledge</u> represents the importance of learning both in the Old Testament and in our Congregational heritage which emphasized education so that each believer would be able to read the Bible individually.
- The <u>Lyre</u> is mentioned in the Psalms and other books of the Old Testament. When the evil spirit came upon Saul, David played the lyre and Saul would become tranquil. In honor of the South Church choir's special gifts, this symbol was chosen.
- Noah sent the top symbol out to see if flood waters had receded. The 2<sup>nd</sup> time Noah sent the **Dove** out it returned with a freshly plucked olive leaf.

#### Right Bottom Window section:

- The bottom panel is the Christ child and **Nativity**, the glass cutters noted that they had to begin the panel just as Jesus' birth began the New Testament.
- The <u>Lamb</u> represents one member of the congregation who supported the stained-glass window project. The lamb was mentioned from the Twenty-third Psalm, sheep representing the flock so carefully and lovingly tended by the Good Shepard.
- The middle symbol represents our Dore and Totley relationship, the **World** being carefully held in two hands is the symbol of the church.
- The four white <u>Lilies</u> represent Easter and the journey from Bethlehem to Jerusalem. Their full, white trumpet blossoms herald "Christ the Lord is Risen today'.
- The purple **Butterfly** was everyone's favorite. Pauline Lane's design which represents resurrection from a distant past to a new future. (II Corinthians 5.17).

The outer border continues with the Vine and Leaves, the unifying element which will emanate from the center two panes, climbing along the exterior edges. Interspersed are bunches of purple grapes and crystals representing the dew of early morning.
